

OUR MISSION

Breakthrough Intercessory Prayer Ministry is here for anyone who wants prayer. Prayer requests may be sent to us by mail, phone, email, fax, or through our website. Your prayer request is sent anonymously to six of our nearly 4,000 intercessors around the world who agree to pray for 21 days for each request they receive. (Prayer requests are identified by first name only, and are never sent to intercessors in the same geographic location as the prayer requester.) You will have your own prayer team of dedicated intercessors holding your needs up before the Lord.

People often report an increased sense of peace during the prayer period. As you read this magazine, you will learn about many prayers that have been answered.

Catherine Marshall was given the inspiration for Breakthrough over 40 years ago. She was a best-selling Christian author who became concerned about the many prayer requests sent to her by her readers. At the same time, other readers were writing to tell her that they longed to be used by God but had no idea what they could do.

God gave Catherine the vision of matching these two groups of people: those with prayer needs and those Christians who wanted to be part of a ministry. Thus Catherine and her husband, Leonard LeSourd, began the Breakthrough ministry.

The 21-day prayer period was chosen based on the story in Daniel 10. Daniel prayed for three weeks before the angel of the Lord was able to come and help him. The angel had been detained by spiritual forces from the first day of Daniel's prayer. Our intercessors may

receive scriptural insights from God for the prayer requester. Those messages, in the form of Scripture verses, are sent to the office and then forwarded to the person requesting prayer. In turn, prayer requesters send their answers to prayer to the staff, which are then forwarded to the intercessors as encouragement for their faithfulness in praying.

We want to hear from you. Pray about becoming one of our intercessors. It is a small expenditure of time compared to how greatly it will impact your life and change the lives of others. As you read this magazine, think of your own stories of answered prayer that you would like to share. Our editorial committee will consider them for publication in *The Breakthrough Intercessor*. Remember also to send us your prayer requests. It is our privilege and joy to pray for you.

Make Your Battle God's Battle

King Jehoshaphat is not a well-known Biblical figure, but his actions are instructive for anyone who struggles with fear and believes in prayer. King Jehoshaphat was the fourth King of Judah, who succeeded his father, Asa. The account of his life is found in 2 Chronicles 17-22. He was 35 years old when his reign began

and he reigned 25 years. His rule was a mixed bag. However, we will focus on the positive: how he was blessed by God because of prayer.

Jehoshaphat joined in an alliance with the Israel and its evil king, Ahab. They suffered a crushing defeat at the hands of the Assyrians. Upon returning home, Jehoshaphat was reprimanded by the prophet of the Lord because of the unholy alliance he made. ("Do not be unequally yoked with unbelievers," 1 Corinthians 6:14, ESV).

Jehoshaphat repented and the Lord blessed him for his obedience. Jehoshaphat made significant efforts to make Judah a righteous nation by following the precepts of God. Then the great challenge came.

An alliance of nations formed to destroy and take over Judah. Their combined forces were much more powerful than Judah. Jehoshaphat's actions to defend Judah and God's supernatural intervention is recorded in 2 Chronicles 20. What did Jehoshaphat do that moved God to action? First, we note that when he heard of the impending attack, he feared, a natural reaction to the likely outcome of Judah being overrun, defeated, and destroyed.

Fear is a common emotion, but the Bible tells us not to fear. In fact, fear is a sin because it demonstrates a lack of trust in God. 2 Timothy 1:7 says that God has not given us a spirit of fear; rather he gives power, love, and a sound mind. We are told what to if we are afraid: "I sought the Lord, and he answered me, and delivered me from all my fears" (Psalm 34:4, ESV). David says here that if we are afraid, then we should pray.

In Jehoshaphat's story, the Lord gave Judah a supernatural victory without the Judeans even having to fight. What did Jehoshaphat do to cause God to act?

He immediately sought the Lord's help and proclaimed a fast throughout the entire country. We know that fasting is not mandated by scripture,

but it's assumed by what Jesus taught his disciples when he said: "And when you fast, do not look gloomy . . ." (Matthew 6:16, ESV) We know Jesus, our model for living, fasted 40 days in the wilderness before he started his formal ministry (Matthew 4:2).

To empower his prayer, King Jehoshaphat gathered all the people together to the Temple in Jerusalem to seek the Lord in prayer. He opened his prayer by recognizing the sovereign majesty and power of God. He reminded God of the His covenant with Judah, and of His promise to preserve it when asked by his people. He humbled himself by admitting that Judah was powerless to defend against the formidable army and asked the Lord to execute judgment on their enemy.

In response, the prophet Jahaziel spoke on behalf of God and told the assembly not to be afraid, "for the battle is not yours but God's" (2 Chronicles 20:15, ESV). He told them how to conduct the battle the next day, but they would not need to fight if they would do what they were told. They worshipped the Lord, and the next day did what they were told. The Lord caused the enemy soldiers to start killing each other until not one survived. The people returned to the Temple to give praise to God, and the fear of the Lord came upon all kingdoms and countries when the story was told.

Intercessors, what's our application? When we have fears, we should pray immediately, and trust the Lord for the victory. For in really scary situations, we may even want to fast. As we are praying for those who request prayer from us, we should pray fervently, empathizing with the fear that they are experiencing. Our goal is, through our prayers, to have the Lord make the requestor's battle His battle, as he did with Jehoshaphat.

Thanks for your prayer and financial support, which facilitates your ability to pray for the fears of so many of God's people. Remember—God answers prayer.

Pray Without Ceasing

Paul challenged his followers with the above three words (1 Thessalonians 5:17). Our response today: "Come on now, Paul, who can do this and fulfill daily responsibilities?"

Yet as an intercessor those three words sit there before us as a reminder—as a challenge—that we're not doing what we should do nor being what we should be. Or is there something here we're missing?

Andrew Murray gives us a clue. "How can I breathe and feel and hear without ceasing? Because they are the functions of a healthy, natural life. And so, if the spiritual life be healthy, under the full power of the Holy Spirit, praying without ceasing will be natural.

The key here is the "full power of the Holy Spirit." Once we invite the Holy Spirit into our lives, we are saying to God, in effect: "Lord, I am helpless and inadequate without you. I am now getting myself out of the way so that your Spirit can operate freely inside me."

The day begins with, "Good morning, Lord. Thank You for a good night's sleep. Thank you for the opportunity to serve You today. I ask Your Spirit to take over now."


Believe that He is doing just that as you read His Word, then intercede for those people and situations that He has given you. In your spirit you pray without ceasing as you dress, eat, travel to work, deal with problems, go all out in recreation. During intervals, as you eat, or walk, or drive, or

stop to think, it will be natural to say, "Lord, give me the words to say to ____. Bless that man over there on crutches. Help me with this phone call."


Thus prayer flows constantly in your spirit all day long. Andrew Murray sums it up this way:

"The death of Jesus Christ brought Him to the place of everlasting intercession. Your death with Him to sin and self sets you free from the care of self and elevates you to the dignity of intercessor, one who can get life and blessing from God for others. Let your faith rest boldly on His finished work. Know that your calling is intercession. Give yourself wholly to it and ere you know, you will find something of this 'praying always' with you."

Now I can do my two-and-a-half mile walk every day and enjoy God's beautiful creation on the nearby trail. I am blessed and yet so unworthy. That is why I am so overwhelmed at His goodness. All this and many more testimonies I could give certainly give me faith and excitement to pray for others, as He will be just as good to them as He is to me.


"Come quick, Grandma," he said excitedly.

Everyone experiences difficulties in life. It can be the loss of a job, an Eillness that never seems to end, a broken marriage and a broken heart, not being able to make ends meet, a physical or verbal attack by a friend or a stranger, the devastation of a natural disaster, and the list goes on. But the greatest tragedy is when such difficulties and trials shatter hope.

When we experience and overcome trials, we can respond in different ways.

We can be happy for ourselves and try to put it all behind us, never thinking of the trial again.

We can become bitter and resentful that we had to endure this trial at all,

never giving thanks for the restoration we have experienced.

Or we can rejoice that we have made it through with the help of God, but to never forget how it felt to be in the midst of that trial. This response develops in us an intercessor's heart filled with empathy. This is the response I have chosen to the many trials I have faced in life. God has developed in me an intercessor's heart with the desire to pray for others who are going through trials of their own.

Many people struggle because the weight of life has shattered their hope. I know I can't restore their hope, but I know the One who can. The devil would like God's people to drown in their trials, but God has promised to restore hope to those who believe.

I have a wooden sculpture of the word "Hope" that I got at the American Cancer Society Relay for Life. I sat it on top of a picture in my bathroom where I would see it every day. Then one day it fell to the floor and shattered into many pieces. My son tried to glue it back together using Elmer's glue, wood glue, and a hot glue gun, but pieces kept falling off. It will never be the same. I bought a new one at Relay for Life the following year to replace it, but I keep both on the windowsill in my bedroom as a reminder of hope shattered and hope restored.

The apostle Peter wrote about weathering trials and the promise that God will restore hope:

"Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you. Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. Resist him, standing firm in the faith, because you know that the family of believers throughout the world is undergoing the same kind of sufferings. And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast" (1 Peter 5:6-10, NIV).

I love Peter's reminder that other believers are "undergoing the same kind of sufferings." This thought comforts me and brings me hope when I am facing a new or continuing trial. It inspires me to pray even in the midst of the trial.

What if we didn't wait until after we have been restored from our trials to intercede for others in prayer? What if, instead, we prayed for others undergoing the exact same trials we are undergoing right now?

- What if, as you look at a pile of bills you don't have the means to pay, you stopped to intercede for all those around the world who were also struggling to make ends meet?
- What if, as you sit in a clinic chair undergoing weekly chemotherapy for cancer, you prayed for the many who had just received their diagnosis or who were facing surgery to remove a tumor?
- What if, as you sit in your living room in shock that your spouse has left you or cheated on you, you cried out to God for all the broken hearts and

failing marriages across the nation?

- What if, as you survey the damage to your house from fire, tornado, or flood in disbelief that it could all be destroyed, you interceded with our Father for the many who lost all their worldly possessions too?
- What if, sitting in the front pew at your loved one's memorial service, you shed a tear and said a prayer for those sitting around you and at memorial services throughout the world?

What if we use our pain and suffering to care for others in pain? How would that change us? How would that change them? Would it give God an opening to restore hope to a people that desperately need it? I believe it would. And I believe it would strengthen the intercessor's heart in all of us.

Will you choose to join me in this intercessory endeavor? I hope so.

Having our four grandkids spend the weekend is all fun and games until someone needs a paramedic at midnight. That someone was Paige, a huggable little first-grader only two weeks past her sixth birthday.

Following a fun time at the park, Paige had gone to sleep amongst her siblings. All were happy, healthy and squeaky clean from their baths. At around eleven-thirty, on that Saturday night last September, she then rocked everyone awake with a croupy cough that seemed to trigger an asthma attack in her. Paige quickly became stressed and had trouble breathing. After my wife administered Paige's rescue inhaler and her airway didn't clear, it was time to dial 911.

That night took me back more than thirty years, to an incident involving Paige's mom, Tamara, our firstborn. I estimate Tamara was three-and-a-half years old. Her little sister Vanessa would have been one. The girls shared a room across the hall from my wife and I.

For the first time ever in her existence, Tamara awoke in the middle of the night with a severe croup. She wasn't asthmatic. She was breathing. No call to 911 was needed. But the horrible barking sound squeezing from her little body frightened her.

I don't recall why Tamara wanted me at the moment. Vanessa may have awakened with the commotion and needed her momma. It could have been

that Tamara viewed me as the protector. Or maybe it was that she knew I worked with tools at my job and at home, and I fixed things. Whatever the reason, she wanted me.

I dropped my heart when I picked up my crying, croupy little girl.

"Fix it, Daddy!" she cried. "Make it stop!"

It was a kick in the gut to think she was trusting me to fix such a thing. How could I explain that a screwdriver would be of no use? My rachet won't fix it. My wrench can't take her cough away.

My little girl had watched me work on our cars and do household repairs. One time, when she was two, I "helped her" use my power drill to put tiny screw holes in our downspout. I made her bike better. Fixed her toys. Why couldn't I stop her scary cough?

There was no tool for this. With each seal-like bark, she cried all the more and pleaded with me to fix it and make it stop. But how? What options did I have? Suddenly, an idea rose within me: counter each cough by whispering the name of Jesus. It might sound flimsy or far reaching, but it was all I had. The only tool at my disposal. My immediate armament. So, I would use it. And I was determined to lie awake all night whispering "Jesus" if necessary.

Holding her close to my heart, I took Tamara and her blanket into the living room and lay with her on the couch. She then barked a croupy cough.



"Jesus," I whispered.

To my amazement, Tamara instantly dropped into a hard sleep. And she slept in my arms, through the night, without another cough. When we awoke in the morning, she was her usual smiling, bright-eyed self and had no memory of her nighttime coughing episode.

Sure, our hearts were saddened to see little Paige breathing through an oxygen mask, surrounded by paramedics, Emergency lights pulsating through the window behind her. But I was confident she would be fine. And because of the same Jesus, she was.

The Unselfishness of God

How the Incarnation gives us confidence in God's love and boldness in prayer

In my dealings with people I have been surprised to find that so many honestly do not believe that God wants our happiness and fulfillment. We have heard all our lives that God is Love, but we insist on "spiritualizing" this. Many Christians have been taught that God's love is different from ours—not the kind His creatures understand. Deeply imbedded in our consciousness is the idea that God is primarily interested in our spiritual and moral rectitude; that, therefore, most of what He requires of us will be about as welcome as castor oil.

Of course God is concerned about our growing into mature spirits. And the God I know sometimes asks difficult things of us, it is true. But His will

also includes happiness here on earth.

But when men persist in these mistaken and tragic ideas of the Creator, how can God show us what He is really like? This is the problem that He had with men. And He solved it in the incarnation. If God were to break into the stream of history—come to earth as a man and demonstrate that He loved people weep with them when they suffered, rejoice with them in moments of gladness—then there might be a closer relationship between God and His children.

A story I first read in my late twenties helped me to see why the incarnation had to be: One day a British scientist discovered a large anthill in his kitchen garden. These were different from any ants he had observed before, so he was eager to study them. But each time his shadow fell across the anthill, the terrified ants scurried off.

"I stepped back," the scientist wrote in his diary, "and sat down on the grass to think out the situation. I had only good will for the ants, did not wish to harm one of them. But how could I make the ants aware of my good will?

"My imagination played with the problem. To those tiny ants, I was an all-powerful creature 'somewhere up there,' whose thoughts they could not

guess, whose ways and intentions they could not know.

"If only I could communicate," the scientist wrote. "But even that wouldn't be enough. Even then, I would be a gigantic being to the ants, and they would never believe that I understood their problems—the minute organization of the hill, their struggles for food, their battles with other ants.

"Only one thing could give them complete confidence. That is, if by

some alchemy, I could—for a time—become an ant—"

The gap between our understanding of nature and the intentions of the Creator is far wider than the gap between that of ant and man. Only as much of God could be contained in human flesh would suffice to demonstrate to us what the Father is like. That is why the Incarnation was necessary.

That is why Jesus insisted, "I have come down from the heaven not to carry out my own will but the will of him who sent me..." (John 6:38, Moffatt translation) and that "He who has seen me has seen the Father" (John 140)

14:9).



Then in watching Jesus, what did His disciples learn about God?

The most obvious thing they observed was the daily intimacy of Jesus' relationship with His Father. At first this must have puzzled them. For always He appeared to be listening to a Voice beyond Himself. There is no record of His ever having argued with anyone about the existence of God; this was fact. Also there was no doubt that God was always present to help, to guide, to succor.

Jesus acted as if there was never any question of the Father's willingness to supply all needs—even such material ones as appeasing hunger. God was concerned about men's bodies along with their souls: Divine love delighted in dispelling pain, in restoring sanity, in straightening crooked limbs and opening blind eyes, even in banishing premature death. Jesus said that in heaven there was an instant readiness to forgive and great joy over finding the lost. And are not these the things that ordinary human father-love or mother-love would delight in doing, if it could?

At every turn, Christ Himself made the comparison between human families and the Fatherhood of God. There is the unforgettable story of the universal Father dealing with the prodigal son. And in the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus asked:

"Why, which of you, when asked by his son for a loaf, will hand him a



stone? Or, if he asks a fish, will you hand him a serpent? Well, if for all your evil you know to give to your children what is good, how much more will your father in heaven give good to those who ask him?" (Matthew 7:9-11, Moffatt translation)

The gospels make it clear that to Jesus, the Father is all-loving, is of the essence of love, cannot help loving. Moreover, this love includes the attributes of love known to all of us—good will, unselfishness, consideration, justice, wanting only good things for us, desiring our happiness. It is not a love dependent on our earning it. God is "for us" first, last, and always. By every word and action, by all the force of His personality, Christ sought to tell us that the Father is always nearer, mightier, freer to help us than we can imagine.

There were those who said that any man who held such ideas must be mad. But the disciples who tramped the dusty roads with Jesus day after day, who witnessed His decisiveness in dealing with people, His fearlessness of criticism, His sense of the sacredness of human personality, the realism with which He faced evil, knew that this One was not mad. Indeed He was more beautifully sane than anyone they had ever known.


